What is inheritance?

Legal UAE definition:

Article 313 of the UAE Personal Status Law 2005 "the imperative devolution of the property and financial rights upon the death of their owner to those deserving"

Or, quite simply:

Money, property, and other assets passing to other people (usually family members) after the owner of them dies



How do individuals legally inherit wealth?

In most Countries there are two ways wealth is distributed:

According to the terms of a <u>valid Will</u>,

OR

- 2. If NO valid Will, the laws of the Country usually dictates:
 - how
 - to whom, and
 - in what shares

This is known as 'Intestate Succession'

Each Country differs and some have mandatory rules for dividing the assets, known as 'forced heirship' like Sharia Rules in the UAE.



What is a Will?

A Will is a **document** prepared in a person's **lifetime**, which provides **specific instructions** on how they would like their assets, money and possessions to be **distributed after their death**.

It can also provide instructions on who would care for minor children if anything happened to both parents.






Main reasons many clients don't have a Will

What happens if I have no will? UAE Laws

Sharia Law

- Primary source of laws
- Distribution rules directs certain shares to specific family members
- Males receive higher share than females
- A non-Muslim cannot inherit from a Muslim
- Example: family with children only 1/8th share to the wife
- Legal guardianship is usually given to the closest paternal male
- In practice: more familiar than foreign laws

UAE Civil Codes & Personal Status Laws

- Pre Sep' 2020 allowed for Home Country Will to be applied if one exists
 - NO WILL = Sharia rules applied
 - BUT IN PRACTICE: apply for this through the local Courts. In any event the vast number of people do not have a Will in their home Country (c.60%-65%)
- Post Sep' 2020 national laws of their choice allowed to be applied to UAE assets
 - BUT real estate property excluded = subject to Sharia Law
 - In practice: apply for this through the Courts

Home country laws or Foreign Will

- 1. How is this applied by Courts in practice?

- 4. Guardianship is not clear and still follows Sharia principles.



What happens if I have no will? Recent Legal Changes

Law No. (41) Of 2022 on Civil Personal Status (effective from 1st February 2023)

- In the absence of a valid Will (Article 11(2):
 - a surviving spouse is automatically entitled to half of the deceased's estate, with the other half passing to the surviving children in equal shares, regardless of gender
 - o If there are no children, the parents of the deceased inherit
 - In the absence of spouse, children and parents, siblings shall inherit, again equally, with no distinction between brothers and sisters
- Removes traditional default distribution of unequal shares between males and females
- Implementing regulations for the new Federal Personal Status Law are yet to be released with further details, clarification on the above and information about a new register
- Still able to apply home country laws or Will as per previous slide but practical issues remain
- Provides assurance that the terms of a (UAE registered) Will shall be upheld in relation to ALL UAEbased assets




What happens if I don't have a Will?

The Solution

TO HAVE A UAE REGISTERED WILL



- CERTAINTY legally recognized by the legal authorities as formally registered with them
- OPT OUT of Sharia Rules and new default rules
- REAL ESTATE is included
- FREEDOM OF CHOICE over who will:
 - care for your children ('legal guardians')
 - manage everything ('executors')
 - receive your assets ('beneficiaries')
 - and in what shares ('distribution')
- BESPOKE and tailored to your needs and circumstances
- AVOID FAMILY DISPUTES (e.g. estranged family members)
- COST EFFECTIVE
- PROBATE (post death procedure)
 - Quicker release of funds and assets with a Will



How can I have a Will registered in UAE?

- 1. Dubai International Financial Centre (DIFC)
- 2. Abu Dhabi Judicial Department (ADJD)
- 3. Dubai Courts (DC) yet to see if a new Wills Registration procedure is established

Further Legal Development

ADJD Muslim Wills

- Muslim expats owning assets in the UAE can now register a Will with ADJD
- Exception: Muslim "UAE Nationals"
- Freedom of choice to leave assets as they wish
- New and untested
- Caveat: risks



What would my Will include?

- Guardianship for children under 21 years
- All moveable and immoveable assets
- Company shareholdings
- Specific gifts or cash sums
- End of Service Gratuity
